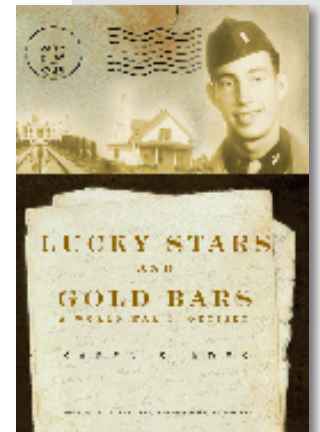


WORLD WAR II FACTOIDS

- On Pearl Harbor Day 2005, some 3.7 million WWII vets are projected to be living.
As of April 2004, 50 of 464 Congressional Medal of Honor recipients were still living.
As of the end of 2003, 33,050 of the 130,201 POWs were still living.

- The U.S. was far from a superpower in 1940 when Congress enacted the first peacetime draft in American history and called up 75,000 conscripts later called draftees. Some 16.1 million served in the armed forces during WWII (1941-1946):

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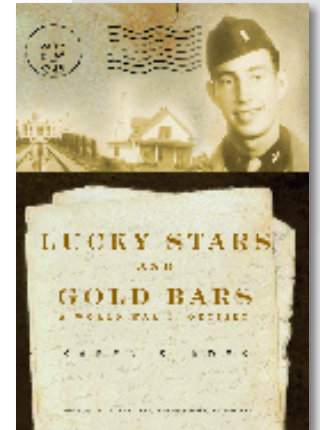

- Estimated WWII casualties by country (military and civilian):

United States	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> GIs, whether in combat or non-combat roles, risked their life from both hostile and non-hostile causes. 28% of GI deaths, whether serving on the home front or overseas, were non-hostile.
292,131	72% hostile deaths caused by land, sea, and air battles (troopship sinkings, airplane crashes, etc.)
115,187	28% non-hostile deaths (disease, training accidents, etc.)
